## Program service

- 1. Tutoring, study skills training, instruction and evidence-based dropout prevention and recovery strategies that lead to completion of the requirements for a: a. high school diploma or its recognized equivalent (including a recognized certificate of attendance or similar document for individuals with disabilities); or b. recognized postsecondary credential
- 2. Alternative secondary school services (such as basic education skills training, individualized academic instruction, and English as a Second Language training) or dropout recovery services (such as credit recovery, counseling, and educational plan development)
- 3. Paid and unpaid work experiences that have academic and occupational education as a component of the work experience, which <u>may</u> include the following types of work experiences:
  - a. summer employment opportunities and other employment opportunities available throughout the school year;
  - b. pre-apprenticeship programs;
  - c. internships and job shadowing; and
  - d. on-the-job training opportunities
- 4. Occupational skill training
- 5. Education offered concurrently with and in the same context as (1) workforce preparation activities and (2) training for a specific occupation or occupational cluster
- 6. Leadership development opportunities, including community service and peer-centered activities encouraging responsibility and other positive social and civic behaviors
- 7. Supportive services
- 8. Adult mentoring
- 9. Comprehensive guidance and counseling, including drug and alcohol abuse counseling, mental health counseling, and referral to partner programs
- 10. Financial literacy education
- 11. Entrepreneurial skills training
- 12. Services that provide labor market and employment information about in-demand industry sectors or occupations available in the local area, such as career awareness, career counseling, and career exploration services
